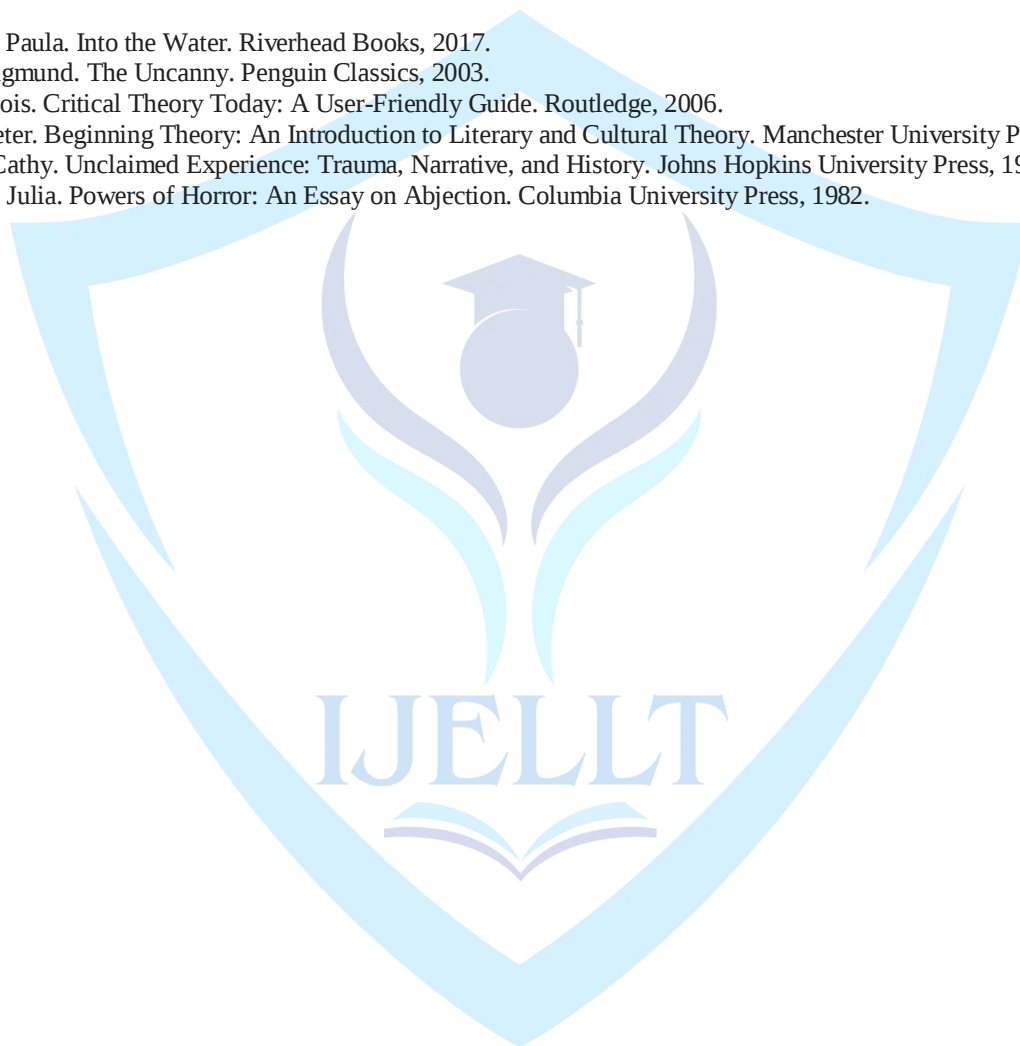
### **Conclusion**
